THE SIGNIFICANCE OF WINDSOR FURNITURE by Christine Mifsud

Windsor furniture seems to have derived its name from Windsor, an English market town, where the furniture was made and sold in the 17th century. Windsor chairs are characterized by stick legs and spindles driven into a plank seat. Hickory and ash woods - tough, springy and easily shaped, were ideal woods for Windsor construction, which did not require nails or screws.

Because Windsor chairs were being made in large numbers in Philadelphia by the mid-18th century, they were occasionally called "Philadelphia" chairs. These chairs were constructed with a variety of types of wood, then painted to create a unified look. Black, which has been selected for the chairs on the back porch at Laurel Hill, was a popular color

Windsor chairs did not require upholstery. They were used in and outside the home. Benjamin Franklin owned two dozen. Thomas Jefferson ordered four dozen for Monticello.

Due to popularity and adaptability, it is easy for us to envision the Rawle, Shoemaker and Physick families enjoying their summers seated on Windsor chairs on the porch at Laurel Hill, overlooking the Schuylkill River.

Spotlight on BARBARA FRANKL, WFGP PRESIDENT



Barbara Frankl was born in Stanford, CT, close enough to NYC to enjoy its cultural benefits but far enough away to be immersed in a lovely suburban life. Barbara attended undergraduate school at the University of Bridgeport in CT and majored in Elementary Education. She moved to the Philadelphia area and attained a Masters Degree at Villanova University. Barbara stayed in the Philadelphia suburbs and taught Elementary School for thirty three years in Central Bucks County. After retiring in 2005, Barbara's attraction to music and teaching drew her to return to education as a Preschool Music Teacher until 2014.

Musical talent is one of Barbara's many attributes. She is a member of the choir of The First Presbyterian Church of Ambler and a member of The Choristers, a highly acclaimed choral group that performs throughout Pennsylvania.

An ardent dog lover, Barbara is the proud owner of Robbie, a handsome West Highland White Terrier (Westie) and award winner of numerous canine scent competitions.

Barbara's dedication to civic responsibilities is evident through her membership in the Greater Conshohocken Chapter of Business and Professional Women, where she is currently the Secretary. Barbara has a deep commitment and interest in historic preservation and is a volunteer and docent at the Evans Mumbower Mill, a member of the steering committee for Wissahickon Trails, and a member and current President of Women for Greater Philadelphia (WFGP), steward of historic Laurel Hill Mansion (LHM).


In 2005 Barbara joined WFGP at the urging of her good friend, neighbor, and mentor, Alma Jacobs, WFGP Charter Member and President for many years. Since that time, Barbara has played many important roles at LHM. She immediately became a member of both the Education and Music Committees, where her background and expertise were highlighted. Barbara co-chaired the Music Committee with Alice Nugent and eventually became sole chair in 2014. Barbara is responsible for the recent success of LHM's Summer Candlelight Concerts series, an important fundraising source for the Mansion. She has procured premier Philadelphia chamber music performers such as violinist Nancy Bean and cellist Lloyd Smith of the Wister Quartet, flutist Mimi Stillman, and classical guitarist Allen Krantz. In her role on the Education Committee, Barbara helped orchestrate Constitution Day and other programs for both children and adults.

After serving six years as Vice President, Barbara Frankl became the President of WFGP in May 2021. During these challenging times, Barbara is committed to look to the future and is in the process of planning activities and events to showcase the rich history of Women for Greater Philadelphia and Laurel Hill Mansion. The WFGP community looks forward to sustaining the mansion, its history, memory, and stories, under the leadership of President Barbara Frankl.

PHILIP PHYSICK RANDOLPH, distinguished Chess Master October 28, 1824-May 05, 1869

"So Philip Randolph is gone! That man had the sweetest moral nature I ever knew. There never was a man so lacking in self-consciousness. The other day I saw in the London Times that the American Randolph one of the three greatest chess players in the world was dead. I knew Philip intimately since he was a boy and I never heard him mention the game. I did not even know he played it. How fine that was!" expressed American poet Ralph Waldo Emerson upon hearing the sad news, "how fine that was!" 1

Philip Physick Randolph became a well regarded member of Philadelphia society and a renowned chess master; recognized for his intelligence, gentle manner and modest character. Philip was the grandson of the "father of American surgery" Dr. Philip Syng Physick, and son of Dr. Physick's daughter Sally and her husband Dr. Jacob Randolph. Dr. Philip Syng Physick purchased Laurel Hill Mansion from William Rawle in 1828 to use as a summer retreat and later bequeathed the house to his daughter Sally Randolph in 1837, when it became known as the Randolph Mansion. 2 Philip Randolph remained the last resident of the mansion before it was purchased by the City of Philadelphia in 1869.

The historic Philadelphia Athenaeum, a member's library located on Sixth Street across from Washington Square, was a hub for chess and other social activities during Randolph's day. There, after graduating from

the University of Pennsylvania in 1846, Philip joined with other chess enthusiasts known as "the Men of Athenaeum," under the direction of founder and mentor Charles Vezin. The Philadelphia team competed in correspondence matches with Boston and New York chess clubs. In 1858, Philip, a steady, patient, analytic player, took part in a famous telegraphic chess contest against New York, and with his teammate H. P. Montgomery, soundly defeated their New York rivals 2-0. Philip stopped competing in chess tournaments after 1858, probably for health reasons, but continued to follow the game, say chess historians.



Philip Physick Randolph died in Randolph Mansion in 1869 at the age of forty-five. Philip never married and was buried at Christ Church Burial Ground, 5th and Arch, Philadelphia, PA. The mortuary notice in the newspaper dated Saturday, May 8, 1869 follows: Philadelphia, Pennsylvania RANDOLPH—On the 5th inst., At 6 A.M., PHILIP PHYSICK RANDOLPH, son of late Jacob Randolph M.D. The relatives and male friends are respectfully invited to attend the funeral, from the residence of his mother, No. 321 S. Fourth Street, Saturday, 8th inst, at 4 PM, without further notice. 3

That same year, 1869, Sally Randolph, Philip's widowed mother who was predeceased by both of her sons, sold Randolph Mansion to the city of Philadelphia. In 1870, the city demolished its barn, outbuildings, and farmhouse, yet the mansion still stands to this day.

- Notes: 1. Some years after his death, Philip was eulogized by Ralph Waldo Emerson in Rebecca Harding Davis's autobiography, "Bits of Gossip."
 - 2. Randolph Mansion was renamed Laurel Hill Mansion in 1976 and is maintained by Women for Greater Philadelphia.
 - 3. The Hill-Physick-House, a historical landmark and home to the Dr. Philip Syng Physick family, is still located at 321 S. Fourth Street and is open for tours and special events.
