## REBECCA WARNER RAWLE HAS HER CHILDREN INOCULATED FOR SMALL POX IN 1759

The current challenge of our own lives, i.e., living with the Covid-19 pandemic and securing scarce vaccinations, parallels the life of 18th century Laurel Hill Mansion heroine, Rebecca Warner Rawle Shoemaker. In colonial America contagious disease was a dangerous condition, and epidemics of smallpox, tuberculosis, typhus, cholera, malaria, scarlet fever and others were commonplace. Small pox was a deadly disease spread by respiratory droplets, and every decade saw outbreaks in most major cities and in most instances, it claimed hundreds of lives. Small pox was brought to the American colonies by European merchant ships and with it, a 40% mortality rate. The vaccine for this scourge was not invented until 1796, and until that time, the only precautions citizens could take were isolation and variolation, where pus from an infected patient was rubbed under the skin of the healthy recipient. The goal of variolation was to produce a mild, protective small pox reaction; however, it sometimes resulted in a severe infection and in 2% of the cases, death. Variolation was widely accepted in Boston, Massachusetts but the average Colonial citizen was very skeptical of the small pox inoculation.

Katherine Warner Howell, Rebecca's older sister who lived in Philadelphia, never inoculated her children and her daughter died from small pox in 1753. A daughter of family friend Hannah Callender Sansom also was not inoculated and passed away from the pox. Rebecca Rawle, a savvy women, recognized the importance of inoculation and was determined to be pro active and protect her children from small pox, but this was difficult. In the mid 1700's, variolation was not readily available in Philadelphia; however, Rebecca and Francis Rawle convinced Dr. John Redman to call at their home and inoculate their young children. The inoculation of little William Rawle and his sisters took place November 1759 and was such a novel event that family friend, Elizabeth Sandwith visited the Rawles to witness the occasion. Rebecca's efforts to protect her family proved wise, none of her children expired from small pox.

## A SALUTE TO MRS. SYLVIA MYERS

It is very appropriate that her favorite color is green and her favorite bloom is the dahlia, since green represents the calming influence of nature and the dahlia is symbolic for beauty, creativity, grace, dignity, and longevity: all so Sylvia! Mrs. Myers joined the Women for Greater Philadelphia in 1976, after she met the group while her Outdoor Gardeners Club of Chestnut Hill was decorating Laurel Hill Mansion for the Christmas tours.

Once Sylvia stepped into LHM she fell in love with the little house and became increasingly involved with Women for Greater Philadelphia. Sylvia became a Director of the Board and Chair of the Garden Committee in the 1970's. Today, Sylvia still serves on the Board and many committees. She volunteers to decorate the house and hostess for the annual Christmas holiday and is a perpetual favorite of the tourists who always enjoy chatting with Sylvia.

The horticultural training and experience Sylvia received made her the perfect candidate for Chair of the Garden Committee at LHM. Sylvia attended numerous courses in flower arranging, flower show procedure and judging at Penn State University and earned a Master Certificate in Flower Arranging from the Garden Club Federation of Pennsylvania. Mrs. Myers has taught and conducted many seminars and workshops in both horticulture and flower arranging and is a Philadelphia Flower Show Judge. Sylvia is a member of numerous horticultural societies, she was the President of the Roxborough Garden Club, a member of the Philadelphia Dahlia Society, and is a lifetime member of the National Accredited Flower Show Judges. She is the recipient of the Roxborough Arbor Day Award and of Six National Arboreal Awards.

Horticulture is not Sylvia's only interest. As a wife to her late husband Nicholas and a mother of three, Sylvia has always put family first. Sylvia was continually active at her children's schools-as a volunteer and an officer in the PTA and as a librarian. She also used her training in Library Science to serve as a Librarian at the Roxborough Library. Mrs. Myers is active at St Lucy's Catholic Church where she is a Eucharistic Minister.

Sylvia's love of the past extended to researching Arcadia's History of Roxborough and she is currently the archivist of the Roxborough Historical Society. Sylvia has held offices in the Roxborough-Manayunk- Wissahickon Historical Society and the Lower Merion Historical Society. She was also a participant in the Archeological Dig at the Frederick Muhlenberg House in 2015.

A strong sense of civic duty and service is instilled in Mrs. Myers. She volunteers to help Veterans and was a hostess at the 19th Depot WWII Reunion at Valley Forge National Park. She also served as an official hostess at the 1976 Bicentennial. Sylvia served as Local Judge of Elections in 2020 and has received numerous Community service awards over the years including The Roxborough Woman of Distinction Award in 2017 and the Soroptomist International Association Woman of the Year in 1998.

Sylvia and her husband, Nicholas, who served in World War II, shared a love of travel and journeyed extensively within the United States. Sylvia's sister accompanied her to many countries including Mexico, Canada, Nova Scotia, Ireland, France, Spain, Portugal, Yugoslavia, Malta, Morocco, Bermuda, Bahamas, Israel, China, Greece, Sicily, and Sylvia's favorite, Italy, home of her ancestors. The Women for Greater Philadelphia have been very fortunate that the amazing Mrs. Sylvia Myers has devoted more than forty years of leadership and service to Laurel Hill Mansion.
